Dear Resident,

It's been a very wet Parish over the last month! Is it climate change beginning to be felt or is it just a normal spell of weather. I do feel, if you look around the world at the increasing extreme weather events occurring, that it can't be ignored. We can only hope that the people in power behave as they should... well, we know some of them won't!

- On the subject of the rain, we had more than our fair share over the last few
 weeks. It resulted in Highways closing the roads, both through Tredington and
 in Stoke Orchard for a period of time. Despite this some motorists still thought
 it was fine to ignore the closures and move the barrier to go on their merry
 way. No thought was given that the wave of water from their vehicle was further
 flooding people's homes.
- We are trying very hard to hold both Highways and the Environment Agency to their responsibilities, as the ditches around the Parish need cleared out and any blockages of pipes from roots and the like are contributing to the slow dispersal of water.
- Further to this, we hope (by being pests), that we can get some action (or at least acknowledgement), that there is an inherent problem with our existing drainage and sewerage arrangement, that causes the discharge through the manholes in both Dean Lane, and in Swan Lane.
- Work commenced on the repair to the bridge at Tredington, but this was halted almost immediately when the Environment Agency decided they wanted to look at Highways plans before they would approve the works. Hopefully they can agree soon, and this can be another issue put to bed.
- The M5 Junction 10 team are still consulting with other parties. With all in agreement, the mitigating measures for Stoke Orchard will be implemented in the next few months.

- The pump track has been a massive success with up to thirty or so children on there at any one time. The older kids are being very mindful of the little ones, so thank you! Could I ask that everyone uses the litter bin by the MUGA please, so that the area doesn't begin to look unsightly. We have tried to get an extra bin up by the picnic tables, but TBC wouldn't empty it so far from the road.
- We are investigating the plans for a bypass from J9 to the A46. There are currently three options, two of which come through the Parish. We will look closely at these and keep you posted.
- With the departure of Helen from the community centre (although she will continue on the committee), Gordon & Heather Webber have stepped in to temporarily manage it until we can find a new manager. We have done a number of interviews and are considering all applicants carefully. With big shoes to fill, and with all of our passionate desire to build on the existing success of the hall and shop, we really want the right person. As ever, anybody who has an hour or two to spare, please, please do offer. There are so many little odd jobs, and our little team can't do them all. I have put a wee list in this newsletter of easy tasks, Please do say if you could help; it would be sooo welcome!

MEET YOUR NEIGHBOUR

I was born in Wellingborough in 1972. We moved to Northampton soon after where my sister was born in 1974.

I clearly wanted to be a cowboy in those early days, and this picture was taken when living in Northampton. The costume was made for me by my mum's sister, my Auntie Chris. I apparently lived in that costume!

My Dad's side of the family are from Northampton and my Mum's were from Leicester. They were Pub landlords until they retired; I think this must be where I developed my love of a good pint!

Sadly, on 3rd November 1975 aged just 25, my Mum, Barbara Pauline Watts, died of a brain haemorrhage. I don't remember much about her being only 2 and half although I was in the house when she died and can vividly recall seeing my mum on the sofa as the ambulance man moved me out of the way on my ride on milk float! That was sadly the last time I saw her. My mum's family lived in Leicester I am pleased we have stayed close, and I have many happy memories of going to spend time with them over summer holidays and Christmas. Had events been different I may well have ended up living in Leicester, and I would not be writing this story as I would not have ended up here in Stoke Orchard. This is one of the last pictures of me and my Mum as she died shortly after this was taken.

Growing up without my mum has had a massive impact on my life and looking back I don't have massively fond memories of my childhood as a result. My dad remarried to someone I can only describe as 'the wicked Stepmother' where we lived in Bedford. Their marriage ended a year later, and we moved back to Northampton where I lived with my grandparents for much of my childhood. My Nana and Grandad were amazing! I have the happiest of memories while living with them. I recall going out every Saturday night to my Grandad's social club to play bingo and eating cheese rolls in the interval! My Dad's brother would often call the bingo and perhaps this is where I get my talent to call the Bingo at the odd event in the Community Centre!







I spent the rest of my childhood in Northampton. My Dad married for a third time to his current wife and my lovely stepmom, Kate, and her two boys. At School I was the first year to take GCSE's and I did my Bronze Duke of Edinburgh Award, where I had the privilege to meet Emlyn Hughes when he presented my award. I used to sing in the church choir and

became Head Chorister and can remember singing solos at weddings (getting paid 50p a wedding!) and angelically singing the first verse of 'Once in Royal David's City' for midnight mass. Unfortunately, in true showbiz style, my voice broke whilst singing a solo at a big wedding! Just before taking my GCSE's, my Mum and Dad moved to Watford, so I remained living at my grandparents to finish my GCSEs before joining them in Watford. Once there, I went to my first Watford football match where I saw a team managed by Graham Taylor win Division 2. Since then, I was hooked, and I have supported Watford FC ever since.

I started work at 16 with a career in retail working as a Sales Assistant in Clements an independent Department Store in Watford. The TV series 'Are you being Served' was actually based on Clements. Yes, there really was Mrs Slocombe, Captain Peacock, and Mr Humphries working there! In August 1990, I secured a Job as a Buyers Clerk in Leather and Travel Goods at The John Lewis Partnership. I worked in various roles within the Partnership for 27 Years! I have many things to thank John Lewis for including meeting my amazing wife Susie and also my long career working in IT. After 25 years' service in 2016, I took my long leave (a fully paid sabbatical) and took over the day to day running of the Stoke Orchard Shop (but more on this later).

After my long leave, I decided to move on and I joined Arcadia (the group that owned Topshop, TopMan, Burton, Miss Selfridge, Evans) as a Business Analyst where I worked on the group's websites. Arcadia was a brilliant place to work and yes, I did meet Phillip Green on several occasions! I also met a number of celebrities including Naomi Campbell, Baroness Karren Brady and Richard Ayoade to name a few. Due to Arcadia's impending administration, I secured a role at Whitbread (owner of Premier Inn) where I work today leading a large team of Business Analysts in the Digital space. If you have ever used the Premier Inn website it will be myself or one of my team that has worked on that. My job is extremely demanding and takes me to London and Dunstable 3 days a week. I have to leave home at 4.30am each day to get to the office at a decent time.

Through my job I often travel to our IT partner based in the beautiful City of Cluj in Romania. I usually visit for a week at time every few months. Cluj is a university town which is in Transylvania. I have not yet seen Dracula, but his castle is an amazing place to visit. Romania is such a friendly and amazing place and I am really lucky to have met some people through my work that have become friends. Cluj is such a lovely and friendly city I would recommend anyone to visit.

I am married to Susie, we have just celebrated our 21st anniversary having met at John Lewis 25 years ago. We have two children; Jamie who is 18 and has just started work as a trainee Paralegal and Hollie,14, who has just started her GCSEs and is an amazing gymnast! Our newest addition to the family is Pipa our gorgeous but slightly mad, Australian labradoodle. Susie and I lived in near Bedford when we were first married but moved to Tewkesbury 18 years ago to be closer to her parents.

We moved to Stoke Orchard 10 years ago. It was the best decision we have ever made! We are so lucky to live in such a lovely village and have made some amazing friends while here. We have



never lived anywhere where there is such a sense of community, have neighbours that have become our friends and where people will say hello to you when you're out walking around the village.

In my spare time, and when I am not spending time with the family or watching Watford or Formula 1, I am a volunteer doing various roles across the community, which I find extremely rewarding. I initially started my journey as a School Governor at the John Moore Primary School in Tewkesbury. This gave me the 'bug' and I now do lots of different roles within education. To be able to do something that can make even a

small difference to a Young Person's life is simply amazing! I also did a stint on the Stoke Orchard Parish Council as well as being part of the Committee that runs the Shop and Community Centre.



I urge anyone if they have time, to do a small amount of volunteering as it can be so rewarding. I will finish by saying that I love living in Stoke Orchard - I have found that helping at the shop or volunteering at the Community Centre is very special and it's a brilliant way to get to know so many lovely people in our community.


Community Centre

Stoke Orchard and Tredington Parish Council Community Speed Watch



Can you help?

We would like to recruit new members within Stoke Orchard to join our dedicated team!

You don't need to commit to weekly sessions but if you're concerned about speeding in Stoke Orchard, please email us at speed.watch@sotpc.co.uk and we can meet you for a chat.

Community Speedwatch (CSW) is a national initiative where, in partner ship with the police, members of communities use detection devices to monitor local vehicle speeds.



The volunteers report drivers exceeding the speed limit to the police with the aim of educating drivers to slow down.

If the data proves a driver is ignoring repeated warnings police can prosecute them. The aim is to:

- reduce death and injury on the roads
- improve the quality of life for local communities
- reduce the speed of vehicles to the speed limit
- increase public awareness of inappropriate speed.

Community Speedwatch does not result in prosecution itself. However, if a persistent speeding driver is identified through the scheme, police can use this evidence to take action against them if required. If there is a persistent general speeding issue where highway improvements are required, the relevant agency will be contacted.



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
