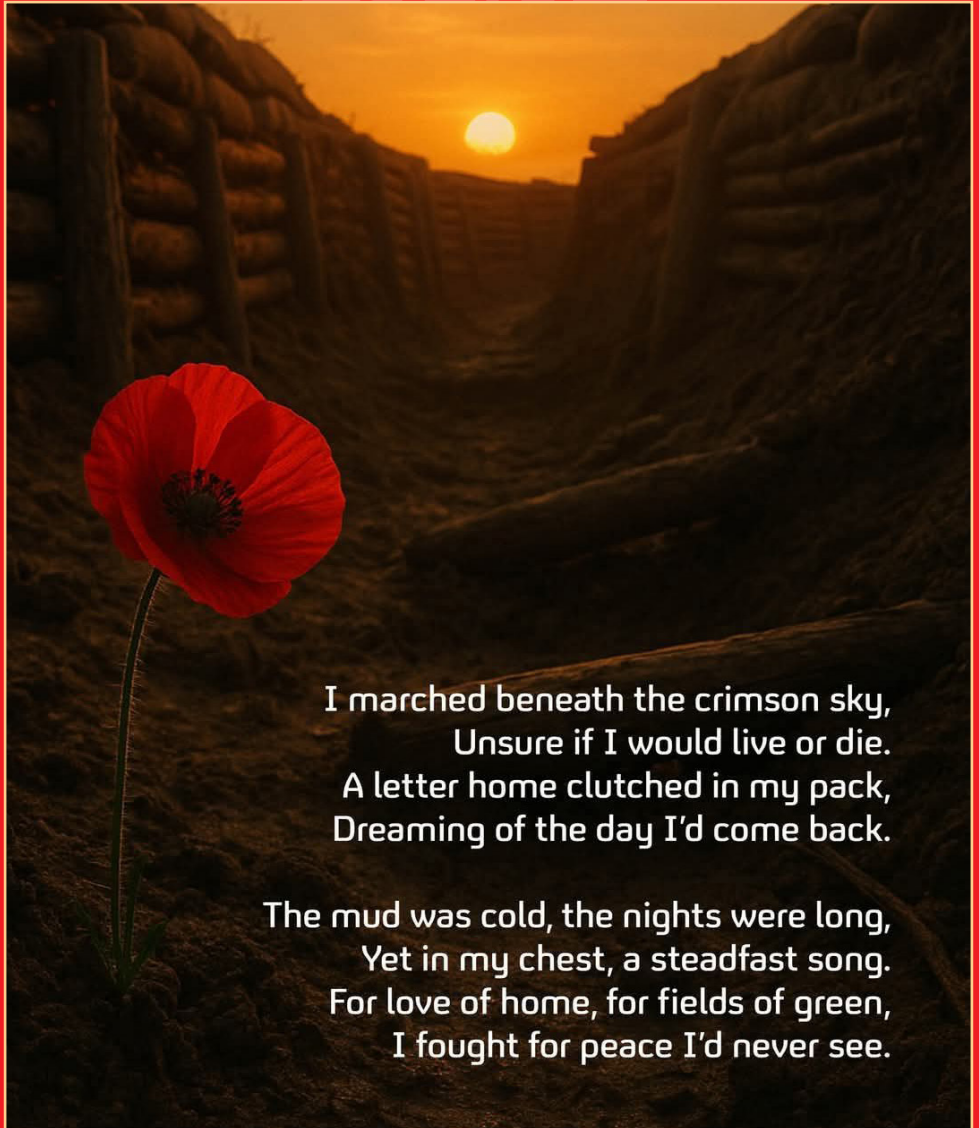


# Stoke Orchard & Tredington Newsletter

# If praying with words is difficult, scents can help

After being away for just over two weeks to attend the clergy conference and then see my family and friends in The Netherlands, the first thing I noticed when I got back to The Vicarage was.... No, not the amount of luggage that needed unpacking or the laundry that needed doing... It was the smell: do you remember that cold musty smell when you get back from holiday?

But it made me think about smells, and how evocative scents are.

Who doesn't remember the smell of their or their (Grand)mother's favourite perfume? The smell of freshly baked bread, grass that has just been cut, and the salty air at the seaside?

Smells remind us of our life journey, of the people we've known, and the places we've been. And smells by way of incense are used in churches and cathedrals too - although not in any of the churches in this Benefice. The book of Revelation in the Bible describes incense as 'prayers of the people' which rise up to heaven (Rev 5.8), and we can use scents as ways to remind ourselves of, or connect to God and God's creation. At this time of year, the smell of the autumn leaves is in the air. And if we can't go out, then maybe we have scented candles or incense for use at home. If praying with words is difficult, scents can help. No words needed, just attention to and an awareness of what we can smell and the memories this scent brings up. Do you use scent as a way of praying, sending unspoken words of the heart into God's presence? Is it something you'd like to try?

I have now unpacked and the musty smell has been replaced by that of fresh laundry - another one of my favourites! What are your favourite scents, and what memories are associated with them?

Ah the nights are drawing in and thoughts are turning to all things wintry, Halloween, fireworks and Christmas! That's not to mention the extra hour in bed in the mornings! 😊 We have several events on at the community centre so please do support if you can.

- Regarding the solar application received from solar company Ilos, residents held a meeting at the hall on the 23rd of October. A useful debate was had and an approach to this agreed by the community. As always, an interest and response from us as individuals counts greatly in whether this goes ahead or not. The Parish Council will comment separately on the issue. Do keep an eye out in this newsletter and on the Residents of Stoke Orchard Facebook page for further information.
- The Parish Council had further discussions with the applicant proposing the application to build 102 houses on land by the solar farm in Stoke Orchard, at which some of our concerns were attempted to be addressed. One assumes he will go back to TBC with some alterations to their plans. However, nothing has changed in the Parish Council's position and the concerns we have remain as before. These include main infrastructure issues such as drainage, roads, school placings and community cohesion.
- I do hope that by the time you read this that the new community shop will have opened its doors. You may have seen the frenetic activity in the latter weeks of October, and I can vouch for the other unseen work going on behind the scenes. Boy, are they all hard workers. From the posts on Facebook, it is very eagerly awaited. It has been a long haul, not just for the PC, but also for Arsh. As you may have seen, it is his brother Mani who will be in charge here, and I'm

sure we will welcome him into our community. I know I can't wait to use them, and from having shopped at their other store in Gotherington, some of their prices are so good, why drive to a supermarket! I'm sure it will be so well used and will justify their faith and considerable investment in our neighbourhood. We wish them well. I wonder how much different it will be?

# NEW ENGAGEMENT FOR THE STRATEGIC AND LOCAL PLAN GOES LIVE

A new phase of engagement for the Strategic and Local Plan (SLP) begins on Monday, 20 October 2025.

The SLP is the shared development plan that will set out the most effective way to manage growth and house building for Cheltenham Borough, Gloucester City and Tewkesbury Borough over the next 20 years.

Drawing on the insights and feedback gathered during the initial engagement in 2024, this is another important opportunity for residents, businesses, and partners to have their say on the future of our area.

Alistair Cunningham, Chief Executive of Tewkesbury Borough Council and Senior Responsible Officer for the SLP, said: *"The Strategic and Local Plan will set out where new housing should go, what kind of homes are needed, what jobs and growth we're aiming for, and the infrastructure required to support it all, whilst protecting the natural and historic environment.*

*"That includes things like community facilities, flood mitigation, roads and cycle paths, green spaces, sewerage - everything that makes growth sustainable and works for the people who live here. That's why your input really matters. We want this to be shaped by the community, not just imposed on it."*

People can explore topic papers and evidence studies, and sign up for notifications about the new papers as they are released, at [strategiclocalplan.org](https://strategiclocalplan.org).

The topic and evidence papers will cover subjects including: the future role of the city and the towns in the area, how many new homes are needed, and how to support economic growth and jobs for people alongside infrastructure needs.

Some of the topic papers and key evidence papers are for information and awareness, and some will invite people to provide feedback on their content. Each paper will be open for a six-week period.

Workshops will also be held to gather views from groups such as town and parish councils, and local business leaders in housing and economic development.

The programme of online engagement will include short films from leading industry experts who will introduce new subjects.

Engagement runs until June 2026, with pre-submission of the plan to government in July 2026, and the final submission in October/November 2026.

**Notes:** As part of the Government's ambitions to increase housebuilding nationally, the timetable to produce local planning policy has been brought forward. Cheltenham Borough, Gloucester City and Tewkesbury Borough councils have been working on a shared development plan for the area - the Strategic and Local Plan (SLP), with a timeline for its production agreed in 2023 as set out in its approved Local Development Scheme (LDS).

The SLP will plan for the most effective way to manage growth and housebuilding in the area.

It is important that the SLP councils are decisive in responding to the Government expectations and clearly set out how the needs for development will be met whilst protecting the areas of value and their character and culture.

The SLP has already carried out engagement on Regulation 18 – spatial options and key policy areas, as well as housing and economic land assessment. These engagement pieces were completed in March 2024. Over 1,000 people took part online and in person. This feedback has been reviewed and used to help inform the new engagement. More information about the 2024 engagement can be found on the SLP website.

The draft SLP will be submitted to the planning inspectorate by August 2026 and will then be examined publicly, offering a further opportunity for people to have their say.

# LEST WE FORGET...

Of the millions of stories of sacrifice and loss to come out of the First World War, perhaps George Edwin Ellison's is the most moving.

By the autumn of 1918, the native of Leeds, England was something of a legend among his squad mates; the 40-year-old career soldier was still alive and kicking after four punishing years of trench warfare. It was no small accomplishment for a Tommy on the Western Front. After all, the British Army had been effectively wiped out and reconstituted with fresh volunteers and conscripts several times over since the start of the conflict.



As a member of the 5th Irish Lancers, Ellison fought in the BEF's first actions in 1914 and would go on to survive the bloody slaughter at Ypres, Armentières, Loos and Cambrai. Tragically, it was on the war's very last day that the middle-aged private's luck finally ran out. At precisely 9:30a.m. local time, Nov. 11, 1918 - George Edwin Ellison perished in a firefight while on patrol in western Belgium. His death came just four hours after the war-ending Armistice was signed at Compiègne; but 90 minutes before the 11 o'clock ceasefire was to go into effect.

Ironically, the ill-fated trooper fell near Mons, the site of his very first battle way back in 1914. Four years later, British generals had ordered an assault on the town knowing full well that the war's end was at hand. They believed depriving the enemy of the ground upon which England had suffered its first defeat of the conflict was a symbolic triumph too rich to pass up.

Ellison was laid to rest in a small military cemetery near the town. By a strange coincidence, his plot is adjacent to the grave of the very first British soldier to be killed in the war - A 16 year-old private from the 4th Battalion, Middlesex Regiment named John Parr. Sadly, Ellison wasn't the only one to fall in the conflict's final hours. In fact, out of the war's more than 22 million casualties, a staggering 11,000 were killed or wounded during that last morning of fighting.



Despite the fact that commanders on both sides knew as early as 5:30a.m. that the war would end in less than six hours, many generals ordered their troops to fight on. Some hoped to secure additional ground in case the cease-fire collapsed later; others simply wanted to land a few final blows on the enemy. A number of artillery units ordered barrages that morning for no other reason than to avoid having to lug crates of unused ordnance to the rear once the guns were silent.

Private First Class Augustin-Joseph Trébuchon was the last Frenchman to die in action during the so-called War to End All Wars. With the cease-fire only 15 minutes away, the former shepherd and 1914 volunteer was making for the Allied lines along the Meuse River clutching what he believed was a vital communiqué. At precisely 10:45, a sniper's bullet rang out killing the 40-year-old Trébuchon instantly. The

message he carried read: "Muster at 11:30 for food." More than 90 other men from the same unit died that morning in heavy fighting. It's unclear how many Germans perished in the action.

Just moments before 11 a.m., a 25-year-old Canadian infantryman from Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan named George Price was shot dead while chasing a section of retreating Germans through the streets of the Belgian town of Ville-Sure-Haine. After briefly taking cover in a small cottage, the young private darted out into the road in hot pursuit of the enemy and was struck in the chest by a rifle round. It was 10:58 a.m.

At almost the same moment 230 km to the south in the Meuse Argonne sector, a 23-year-old American private named Henry Gunther was single-handedly charging an enemy machine gun nest. The Baltimore native and son of German immigrants had been drafted into the U.S. Army a year earlier. After serving as a supply sergeant, Gunther was busted to private when a military censor reported him for criticizing the war in a letter home.

Determined to win back his stripes, Gunther spent the final weeks of the conflict volunteering for dangerous assignments. With the war's end just seconds away, the former bookkeeper fixed his bayonet and sprinted towards an enemy position as his comrades stayed in their foxholes. The Germans opposite the Allied lines realized that peace was at hand and frantically tried to wave off the advancing doughboy. As the American closed to within grenade-throwing range, they had no choice but to open fire. Henry Gunther died at 10:59 a.m. He was posthumously restored to the rank of sergeant and awarded the Distinguished Service Cross.

In all, more than 4,000 Germans also became casualties in the war's final morning.

There seems to be no clear indication of which of them was the last to fall. Some speculate that it might have been a lieutenant by the name of Tomas. According to one account, the young officer was struck down in a hail of gunfire by U.S. troops several minutes after the truce while attempting a parlay. His killers were supposedly unaware that it was after 11 a.m.
